Counselors are meeting with students in March and April to determine electives and core courses for the 2014-2015 school year. These courses will be posted on ParentLink before the end of the school year.

This has been an exciting year so far, and with the ongoing support of our parents, Hyde Park will continue to be a 5-Star school. InvestWrite Competition

Craig Hammond, a sixth grade student at Hyde Park Academy of Science and Mathematics, has received a considerable honor. On March 5, 2014, Ms. Sheri A. Perez presented Craig with a certificate and prize as the 8th place NATIONAL winner in the InvestWrite competition.

InvestWrite is an innovative national writing competition which is an outgrowth of The Stock Market Game. Students participate by writing essays in their grade division. Hyde Park students participated in the middle school category composed of students in grades 6 through 8. The topics relate to investment principles linked to The Stock Market game program.

The national judges are member of the Securities Industry. They evaluate student essays based on three criteria.

- A. Understanding of the Subject Matter: The student must exhibit knowledge regarding the concept of researching and planning an investment strategy. Students must use relevant terminology and display an understanding of the core concepts of the stock market in the scenario.
- **B.** Rationale: The written argument should be presented in a manner that indicates there was a logical thinking process included in addressing the assignment.
- C. Writing Style: The student must exhibit the ability to communicate thoughts in an engaging and inviting manner.

Craig will be honored in May when he will be presented with his Nevada State award. Additionally, his instructor, Ms. Judy Kraus, will also be honored for having State winners consistently for the past three years. We congratulate them on their accomplishment and on their dedication to "Learning for Mastery".


At any time on or off school grounds when the conduct has a direct impact on the health, welfare, and safety of students or school employees.

We battle childhood Cancer

The month of March was life changing for one of our teachers. Kelly Gonzalez left on a Friday, and returned to us BALD. Going bald wasn't a hard decision to make for Kelly, or the members of her family. They were asked by Kelly's daughter, Jacey, to participate in raising money for St. Baldrick's Foundation. Jacey, a Hyde Park graduate and leukemia survivor, had lost her hair multiple times throughout her treatment and had finally grown her hair to over sixteen inches long, when she approached her parents asking them to participate in St. Baldrick's. She told her parents that she felt she needed to do more and stand in solidarity with those (many of whom are her friends), who are still suffering from cancer. She wanted to raise money for St. Baldrick's, and in addition, she wanted to be a "shavee" and have her head shaved. She wanted her parents to join in, and, without hesitation, her parents said, "yes"!

After a few months of fundraising, and MANY contributions from our amazing Panther family, Team Gonzalez raised just under \$3,000! On March 1st, they sat on stage as a team and together, had their heads shaved. Kelly said, "I've never been more proud of my daughter...and my family".

St. Baldrick's head-shaving events began as a challenge between businessmen and have grown from one event in 2000 to over 1,300 events in 2012, raising critical funds for childhood cancer research, becoming the number one funding source of childhood cancer research other than the government. In the 1950s, almost all kids diagnosed with cancer died. Due to the advances of cancer research, today about 85% of kids with the most common type of cancer will live. Progress has been limited for many other types, and for some kids there is still little hope for a cure. That is why people today shave their heads to help fund cancer research.



Math Counts

Hyde Park is the 2014 Nevada State MathCounts Champions!!! This is our 5th state title in the last 6 years. On Saturday, 2-8-14, the students participated in the 2014 Southern Nevada Chapter MathCounts Competition held at the Clark County Government Center. There were a total of 16 middle schools and 125 students at the competition. Hyde Park dominated the competition winning 1st place overall, and had 8 of the top 10 individual students. Ashish, Vincent Tang, and Vincent Pan will compete in the 2014 MathCounts National Competition in Orlando, Florida May7th-11th. Mr. Lawrence will be joining them as the Nevada coach. The first place individual was a student from Coral Academy in Reno.

Test-Taking Tips that Work

- Read test directions carefully and thoroughly. If the test includes multiple sections, be sure to read each set of directions.
- Read each question carefully to determine its meaning.
 Make sure you know what the question is asking before you begin to answer.
- Be sure to read through all the answer choices before marking one as correct.
- Use context clues to determine the meaning of unfamiliar words
- Eliminate answers that don't make sense. Try to narrow the choices down to two when you are unsure of the correct answer.
- When reading passages are involved, read the questions first to determine what you are looking for as you read the selection.
- For math problems, use scratch paper and double check to make sure you've copied the problem correctly. Line up place values neatly to avoid careless mistakes.

Dress Code

Nevada State Spelling Bee


